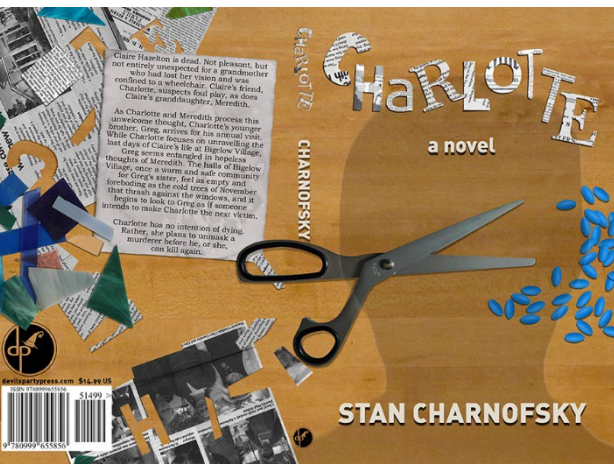


Death by unnatural causes

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About the Book

Claire Hazelton is dead. Not pleasant, but not entirely unexpected for a grandmother who had lost her vision and was confined to a wheelchair. Claire's friend, Charlotte, suspects foul play, as does Claire's granddaughter, Meredith.

As Charlotte and Meredith process this unwelcome thought, Charlotte's younger brother, Greg, arrives for his annual visit. While Charlotte focuses on unraveling the last days of Claire's life at Bigelow Village, Greg seems entangled in hopeless romantic thoughts of Meredith.

The halls of Bigelow Village, once a warm and safe community for Greg's sister, feel as empty and foreboding as the cold trees of November that thrash against the windows, and it begins to look to Greg as if someone intends to make Charlotte the next victim.

Charlotte, however, has no intention of dying. Rather, she plans to unmask a murderer before he, or she, can kill again.

STAN CHARNOFSKY is a professor of psychology at California State University, Northridge (CSUN), and has taught there for more than fifty years.

Prior to teaching, in the 1950s Charnofsky signed with the New York Yankees and played in their farm system for six years. He later managed teams in Edmonton and St. Petersburg, and also at CSUN.

He was the founding director of the Educational Opportunities Program at CSUN (then known as Valley State College). Charnofsky was inducted into the CSUN Athletic Hall of Fame in 2016. In 2016, Charnofsky received the Distinguished Teaching Award at CSUN. His numerous publications include **When Women Leave Men: How Men Feel, How Men Heal** (New World Library) and **The Deceived Society** (Trafford). He resides in Northridge, California.
